Project Summary

The Pacific Beach Lifeguard Station was an outdated building constructed over 35 years ago. The facility served two primary functions which included a lifeguard station for approximately two miles of public beach and public restrooms located on the upper floors. Since the aged tower was built in the 1960's, it no longer served either of those functions adequately.

Nasland Engineering provided planning and design services for the new lifeguard station. The scope of work included were concept plans for upgrading the streets; preparation of plans, specifications and cost estimates; hydrological and hydraulic studies; and storm drain improvements.

The board walk in the foreground becomes a plaza that ties the lifeguard station with public restrooms of similar architectural character. The pelican statue is part of the artwork incorporated in the project.
